

Traditional (Print) Resources

Books:

Cite books by providing the name of the author (if available), the title of the books, and publication information about the book. Publication information should include city of publication, name of the publisher, and the year of publication. Include the word 'print' after the publication information.

Meacham, Jon. *American Lion: Andrew Jackson in the White House*. New York: Random House, 2008. Print.

Purkey, William W., and Betty L. Siegel. *Becoming an Inspirational Leader: A New Approach to Professional and Personal Success*. Atlanta: Humanics Trade Group, 2003. Print.

An Excerpt from a Book Within Another Book: Include information for the original work followed by the information for the newer book.

Karlsen, Carol F. *The Girls' Response Was a Response to Stifling Social Conditions*. 1987. *The Salem Witch Trials*. Ed. Laura Marvel. Farmington Hills: Greenhaven Press, 2003. 87-94. Print.

Print Articles:

Cite articles from print publications starting with the author's name followed by the article title the name of the journal/periodical, volume number, issue number (if available), publication date, page numbers, and the word 'print'. General reference books do not require the full publication information, but subject specific ones do.

Article from a Reference Book:

"Button." Def. 1c. *The Oxford English Dictionary*. 2nd ed. 1991. Print.

McLean, Ian, and Alistair McMillan. "Gaullism." *The Concise Oxford Dictionary of Politics*. 2nd ed. New York: Oxford University Press, 2003. Print.

Article from a Scholarly Journal:

Phalen, Tim. "More Than a Trend: Maximizing the Potential of the Prehospital 12-lead ECG." *Journal of Emergency Medical Services* 34.3 (2009): 18-22. Print.

Weekly or Bi-Weekly Magazine Article:

Monthly Magazine Article:

Thomas, Les. "Kentucky's Wild Wonder." *Southern Living* Apr. 2009: 98-101. Print.

Article from a Newspaper:

Hungerford, Ashley. "Olens Running, But Not for Governor." *Marietta Daily Journal* 22 Apr. 2009: A1+. Print.

Live Speech:

Obama, Michelle. "One Nation." 2008 Democratic National Convention. Pepsi Center, Denver. 25 Aug. 2008. Address.



Electronic Resources

Citing an electronic resource requires similar information as a print source. How you cite an electronic resource depends on the method used to access it, and you need to know the date of access for internet sources. Citing the url (or web address) of an internet resource is only necessary when required by your instructor, or you feel that a reader of your paper would not be able to find the resource otherwise. Remember, not all internet sources provide full citation information. In such a case, provide as much as information you can find. If you don't have the page number for an article from an online (internet) database, put 'n. pag.' If you are required to include the url/web address it should come after the date of access, and should be in this format: <http://www.url.com>. Internet resource citations should be followed by the word 'web'.

Article from an Online Periodical/Magazine: Not a periodical/magazine accessed through Galileo or Library databases.
