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Grand Opening of the Health Education Center at North Metro Campus

A new 42,600 sq. ft. building opened Fall Ouarter 2009—dedicated solely to healthcare programs! It's the first new building to be constructed at North Metro since the original campus was built in 1989. The Health Education Center (HEC) is the first "green" building within the Technical College System o f Georgia! Environmentally friendly construction materials. water-conserving plumbing fixtures, minimal tree removal, maximum use of natural light inside the building, and the method used to dispose of construction site waste all attest to the college's commitment to environmental responsibility. In addition to classrooms,

the building houses science labs, faculty offices and workrooms, a student lounge, student study rooms, and an open computer lab. Some of the health programs that will be housed at the HEC are: Practical Nursing, Radiography, Physical

Therapist Assistant, Medical Assisting, and EMT/Paramedic.

What's an Ombudsperson?

The word *Ombudsman* is Swedish in origin and means "grievance person." Dr. Betty Ann Cook is the *Ombudsperson* for the college, serving as a <u>confidential</u> resource for all CTC students.

What does the Ombudsperson do?

In a neutral setting, the Ombudsperson is a good listener; she seeks fair and equitable solutions to your learning- or work-related concerns or conflicts in a confidential, informal, impartial, neutral, and non-adversarial manner. Her views are not biased by instructors or administrators, since she reports directly to the President. As a guide, she supports effective communication, cooperation, and civility while advocating fairness, equity, and compliance with college policy and procedures. Dr. Cook coaches individuals, facilitates communication between persons and departments, acts as mediator, provides information on



college policy, and recommends changes in policies and practices when needed. She provides information on conflict resolution in terms of "what to do" and "how to do it."

What doesn't the Ombudsperson do?

The Ombudsperson doesn't take sides in a dispute or participate in any formal grievance procedure or legal actions. The Office of the Ombudsperson is not a point of contact to give notice to the college that a problem exists.

When might I want to seek the services of the Ombudsperson? Students typically come to the Ombudsperson with questions regarding the conflict resolution process. Conflicts and concerns can develop from...

- Disputes about grades or instructors
- Interactions with difficult people/trouble makers
- Dealing with over-talkative classmates
- Encountering general uncivilized behavior





A Brief History

The campus opened its doors as Pickens Area Vocational-Technical School in August 1967 with a 22-member staff and nine program areas of study. The name was changed to Pickens **Technical Institute** in 1988 (after becoming a unit of the Georgia Department of Technical and Adult Education). A new name in 1999, Appalachian Technical Institute, accurately focused attention on the school's service area: Cherokee, Fannin, Gilmer, and Pickens counties. Continued growth led to the opening of a new location in 2005, the *Woodstock Campus*. The campuses in Jasper and Woodstock have become part of the seven-campus college now known as Chattahoochee Technical College.

How do you get there?

From Atlanta via I-575...

- ♦ Take I-75 north to I-575.
- ♦ At approximately mile marker 30, I-575 becomes GA 5/515. Continue straight to mile marker 7 (which is at the intersection of Hwy 5/515 and Hwy 53).
- Turn right (east) & drive on Hwy 53 BUS into Jasper for 1.7 miles.
- ◆ Turn left (north) at light onto Burnt Mountain Road & drive for .2 mile.
- ◆ Appalachian Campus is located on the left.

From Blue Ridge...

- ◆ Take I-575 south to Hwy 53 & turn left. (There's a BP gas station and large shopping center on the right.)
- Go approximately 2 miles, & turn left at the 3rd traffic light onto Burnt Mountain Rd.
- Cross the railroad tracks, & the campus will be on the left.


