What's that? You may have heard some buzz about Georgia's technical colleges (including Chattahoochee Tech, of course) converting from the Quarter to the Semester system. Well, it's true! Beginning Fall 2011, the academic calendar will look like this...

Fall Semester: August - December (15 weeks + exams)

Spring Semester: January - May (15 weeks + exams)

Summer Semester: May - August (10 weeks + exams)

(addition to the standard academic year)

You're probably asking yourself, "How will this affect me?" Actually, the change was made by the Technical College System of Georgia with your best interests in mind. With this change, our academic calendar will align with those of K-12, the University System of Georgia, other TCSG colleges as well as most colleges and universities across the country. While the quarter system is divided into four 10-week periods, the semester system has a fall and a spring semester, each 15 weeks long (plus exam time).

Some of the Benefits...

- ✓ More in-depth coverage of course content.
- Increasing your career opportunities and your worth in today's workforce.
- ✓ More time to master course content.

- ✓ Easier transfer to other institutions due to calendar alignment.
- Extended learning opportunities for students in a clinical rotation or internship.

Additional Facts...

- * Student access to Federal and state financial aid should not be affected.
- * Total annual costs should remain the same.
- * Total completion time for most programs will not increase.
- * Students can meet with advisors to review their personal "crosswalk" academic plans (to help you *cross over* from quarters to semesters).
- * Class size will not increase.
- * Student GPA will not be affected.

We realize you'll likely have some questions (and maybe some concerns) about the whole conversion process. The offices of Student Affairs, Academic Affairs and Financial Aid are here to answer your questions and help alleviate some of the apprehension you may feel. New Financial Aid Year & Payment Deadlines

You've probably seen signs around campus informing students to re-apply for financial aid. *Now* is the time to apply for financial aid for the 2010-2011 academic year, which began July 1, 2010! Students may apply using the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at http://www.fafsa.ed.gov. Staff members in all of the financial aid offices are eager to answer your questions, assist you with the application process, and help in other ways that may be needed. It's that time again...PAYMENT DEADLINES! With registration for fall quarter starting soon, it's very important that students pay attention to advertised tuition/fee payment deadlines. Students with unpaid tuition/fees at the advertised deadlines will have their schedules purged! So, don't lose your classes; be sure to pay your fees and/or follow up with the financial aid offices if you're not sure of your eligibility for HOPE, Pell, etc. Don't guess...ASK!


It's hard to believe this much has been accomplished! Actually, we're sure the merger was merely the beginning of the great things that lie ahead for our students and our college!

Why do I gotta speak good English?

Or you might ask, "Why do I need to speak English well?"

Bottom-line answer: to be taken seriously as an educated person and to get somewhere worthwhile in life. Here's something to think about. We generally associate language with communication. However, the repercussions of having language skills, or lacking them, go far beyond the realm of communication. Our command of the language of the land in everyday speech affects our confidence, our self esteem and the image we portray to others about our values, intelligence and convictions. Quite honestly, clear and proper speech (and writing) can mean the difference between getting the job you want or losing out to a more "professional" sounding candidate—even if you are more qualified for the job!

Typically, business communication is formal and must contain proper spelling, grammar and punctuation. But what about less formal digital communication? You know, the words you type into emails or blogs, onto Facebook walls, or within Twitter tweets? It's important to remember that you are the writer, editor, and person who approves each entry—since your words become visible instantly and, most often, permanently! You might not adhere to all the rules of grammar and punctuation in your postings, but at least aspire to get it right. At the very least, you'll be training yourself for future, more consequential, written communication. And, people may actually pay more attention to your postings if your words are easy to read, follow and understand. Glaring errors tend to divert your audience's attention from the message you are trying to convey. Website designer, Steven Bradley, amusingly stated when referring to digital communication, "It's OK to misuse the language at times, but it's best if you know that you are misusing the language and understand your reasons for doing so!"



Doesn't it seem ironic that in the world of social networking and instant communication—where more people than ever see the things we write—we tend to put less care into those words and sentences and paragraphs?

Granted, "proper" English doesn't always sound very pleasing, as in Winston Churchill's statement, "Ending a sentence with a preposition is something up with which I will not put." Huh? You might need to pay closer attention to your spelling—and make sure you're using the correct words in your sentences. Most of the words in the next sentence are spelled correctly but aren't the correct words the writer should have chosen. "Bad grammar makes me lose my mined. If there car brakes down, their going to be late. Spell check only cot one out of six mistakes. That's knot good." See what we mean?

One more thing: Although most of your emails might be informal with messages to family and friends, when sending emails to places of business (as when you're applying for a job), proper grammar, spelling and punctuation become a necessity. Here's what one potential employer had to say about a job candidate: "This guy wants to work here, but he couldn't even take the time to make his one-paragraph email to me grammatically correct." Whoa!

We don't want to cramp your style and creativity. We're just giving you some things to think about that will help you're-your readers and listeners understand exactly what your you're trying to say.

CTC's Nursing Program Recognizes National Nurses Week

National Nurses Week was marked this year by Chattahoochee Tech's own Nurses Week Celebration, an Ice Cream Social held at the North Metro Campus on May 4. Director of Practical Nursing Larry Hannigan clearly enjoyed the festivities, as did 74 students plus many health sciences faculty members. The celebration highlighted the rich history of nursing and its impact on modern-day nursing practices; nursing students were given a small memento of the event.

Mr. Hannigan provides some enlightening background information...

Years ago, when nurses were trained in hospital-based diploma programs, annual celebrations were held in the students' living quarters during their three-year training period, typically a large Victorian house. The house had a

"reception room" with a large piano. Tea parties were held there to recognize a variety of events, such as transition from "probie status" to student nurse status, moving on to the next year of training, and graduation. This gave nursing school faculty and students the opportunity to interact with families, the hospital staff, and community members.









National Nurses Week: May 6-12, 2010

National Nurses Week is celebrated during the first week of May each year. Although there are week-long activities, May 12, the birthday of Florence Nightingale (considered the founder of modern nursing), is always designated as National Nurses Day. Since 1997, May 8 has been selected as National Student Nurses Day!

Persistence Pays Off!

In 1953, Dorothy Sutherland of the U.S. Dept. of Health, Education, and Welfare sent a proposal to President Eisenhower to proclaim a *Nurses Day*, beginning in 1954. That proclamation was never made; however, a *National Nurses Week* was observed the week of October 11-16, 1954; this did not turn out to be an annual observance. In 1974, President Nixon officially proclaimed a *National Nurses Week*, but the celebration was not to gain momentum until 1982. That year, President Reagan signed a proclamation that May 6 would be named *National Recognition Day for Nurses*. Expanded to a week-long celebration by the American Nurses Association, *National Nurses Week* was established in 1990 and became a permanent annual celebration in 1994.

What about other health practitioners?

Today, some hospitals have instituted a yearly *Hospital Week* in place of the traditional *Nurses Week*. They've done this in recognition of the fact that it would be difficult for nurses to do their jobs without the mutually-supportive roles of all hospital personnel. Doesn't this underscore the fact that *teamwork* is important in every occupation? At Chattahoochee Tech, we offer a variety of excellent nursing and allied health programs. Welcome Student Visitors!

This month Chattahoochee Technical College will host 25 high school students from Seongdong Gu, South Korea, as they visit and learn in a 21-day cultural and educational exchange program. The students are the latest in a series of such exchanges as part of the sister-city relationship between Cobb County and Seongdong Gu (now in its fourth year). This is a collaborative initiative between Chattahoochee Technical College and the Marietta City School System. CTC's Foreign Affairs Liaison Dr. Betty Ann Cook states, "We see this as an opportunity to continue building relationships between our students and students within the global community. As a part of this program, they will be participating in an intensive English program and activities to help them learn more about American culture while getting to know students from CTC and Marietta High School." The program was coordinated by Atlanta resident Sunny Park, a native of South Korea, CEO of General Building Maintenance and president of the America Korea Friendship Society. The students, who were selected from five high schools in South Korea, will take part in daily classes in English at the Marietta campus, focusing on developing and strengthening reading, speaking, writing and listening skills. Housed at Southern Polytechnic State University, the 25 students and their mentors from Marietta High School will also participate in cultural and fun opportunities (like shopping!) around metro Atlanta.


