What are some essential skills and abilities a student needs to have in order to be successful in program of study?

In the CIST department we have four programs: Computer Programming, Web Applications Development, Networking and Information Security. All 4 areas require the following skills:

- Analytical
- Problem solving
- Diagnosing
- Troubleshooting
- Organizing/classifying
- Recognizing elements, relationships
- Reviewing/evaluating
- Coordinating work with others

- Decision making
- Attention to Detail
- Ability to follow instructions exactly

Typical work activities/occupational functions:

- Working independently
- Collecting and organizing data
- Solving problems
- Writing new software/programs
- Testing and debugging programs

What additional training would you recommend for a student who wants to go to the next level in this field?

Do any of the occupational courses transfer easily?

It depends on the receiving institution of course. Some courses will transfer into "elective" slots at the receiving institution's program. It works best when we have an articulation agreement such as the 2+2 program (Bachelors of Applied Science in IT, aka BASIT) at SPSU. In that particular case ALL the courses in our AAS programs are accepted.

What are some common limitations, if any, in this program that students face?

They are not prepared. Weak in critical reasoning and analytical skills.

Are there any exams/certifications that a student needs to take after completing the courses? Are these exams/certifications offered on campus?

This depends greatly on the particular program. In general there are few that a student would "have to have" to get a job. A+ for computer repair is probably the one that would be most needed. None offered at CTC.
